1944	Born in the former Czechoslovakia, now the Czech Republic.
1967	Graduated at the Czech Technical University of Prague, first photographs published following an exchange student visit to the former USSR (1967).
1969	Moved to England and worked first in a factory and after re-qualifying as a structural engineer.
1976	First overseas assignment as a chartered engineer in Nigeria, photographed FESTAC (African Festival of Art and Culture), small commission for a calendar in Nigeria.
1979	Expanded career towards civil engineering, obtained Travelling Fellowship to Scandinavia, photographed housing and sport complexes for a study visit.
1980-1982	Based in Nairobi, Kenya, worked on multidisciplinary projects; photographed fragile ecology of the Great Rift Valley as a case study for the first Maasai tribe water supply.
1983	First assignment in Saudi Arabia and coastal plain of the Red Sea for international projects management.
1984	Joined Gene Nocon Photographers' Workshop in London.
1985-1988	Back in the UK, pre-feasibility study for the Folkestone Harbour re-development.
1989	Extensive visit to South America, incl. Patagonia, Glacier Valleys, and Atacama Desert, returned to Saudi Arabia, central region desert visits; a group exhibition of wildlife in Turin, Italy, Nick Edel Gallery.
1990	Exhibition at Westinghouse Furniture System Offices, London.
1991	Exhibition <i>Heat and Light</i> , Barbican Centre Concourse, opposite the then Royal Shakespeare Theatre.
1992	Moved to Kiev, Ukraine, EU technical assistance coordinating role, Chernobyl projects, joint exhibition <i>Face to Face</i> with a sculptor and a painter in 1995.
1998	Exhibition "The Interrupted Journeys" in Atrium Gallery, Prague, a joint exhibition with a sculptor and a painter.
2001-2005	Visits to Myanmar, Cambodia, and Central America; long-term work assignments in Kazakhstan and Kyrgyzstan; travelled widely in Central Asia, incl. glaciers around Khan Tengri on the Kyrgyz / Kazakh / Chinese borders.
2004-2012	Southern Caucasus, a long-term assignment in Azerbaijan, exhibition in Baku "Baku Lights" in Europa House.
2008	Solo exhibition <i>My Imaginary Homeland</i> at Artefact Gallery, London; moved to Moldova for another long-term work assignment.
2012	Back in Baku on a long-term assignment, Dec 2012 a solo exhibition in Atrium Gallery, Prague.
2014	Joint exhibition with a group of painters in Bavorov in the Gothic city complex.
2016	February, an exhibition in the Academic Library of the University of Southern Bohemia.
